#### **POS 4413**

## The Presidency



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This course focuses on the modern (post-1945) presidency and its role in the American political system. Topics cover the institutional structure, relations with other institutions including the media, public opinion, domestic/foreign policy, and typologies of presidential power. The last half of the course is dedicated to applying theories of presidential leadership to the individuals who have held office since 1945 (Truman-Trump). In this Spring Semester 2020 the course will also follow the unfolding of the Trump impeachment/trial in the Senate as well as the Democratic primaries and caucuses for that party's nomination beginning in February.

# **Course Policies**

Attendance/Participation: Students are expected to attend all class meetings and to participate actively in classroom discussion and debate. Students are expected to have read the material before class to prepare for discussions. Students are expected to be on time for class meetings. Attendance will be taken at all class meetings and students will be assigned seats after the first week of classes. Students who are late, or do not attend, will be marked absent. The attendance component of the grade will be calculated by the number of classes students attend divided by the total number of class meetings. Excused absences follow University guidelines (medical, legal, etc.). The participation component of the grade is assessed on the basis of classroom interactions (debate, questions, instructor questions to students, etc.).

<u>Demerits and Use of Cell Phones, Laptop Computers, and Gadgets</u>. The use of cell phones, laptops, or any other electronic gadgets is PROHIBITED in class. Playing on computers, text messaging, or doing work for other courses on these devices is a distraction to the instructor and to other

students, and at fundamental odds with the educational mission of the course and the objectives of a university education.

Any student who engages in any activity on a cell phone, laptop, or other device during class time will receive a 2.5% demerit for each incident that will be deducted from the total course grade percentage at the end of the semester. In other words, a student who has a grade of 87 (A-) at the end of the semester, and who engaged in this behavior 4 times would receive a course reduction of 10% (4 x 2.5%=10%) and receive a 77 (B-) as the final course grade. ALL CELL PHONES MUST BE TURNED ON SILENT MODE AND STORED AWAY DURING CLASS. LAPTOPS ARE NOT PERMITTED. There is a "Demerit" column in Canvas that will keep a running total of penalty points throughout the semester. Students unwilling to comply with this rule are counseled not to enroll in this course.
