

Course description

Politics is a struggle for power. To borrow a phrase from the great political scientist Harold Lasswell (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Harold_Lasswell) (1902-1978), politics is the business of determining who gets what, when, and how. This course will look at the role of the President of the United States in the American political system. The focus of the course will be the modern (post-1945) presidency, though we will spend some time examining the historical development of presidential power. Topics will include the constitutional bases of presidential power, the institutional structure of the presidency, and relations with other institutions including the media, Congress, the bureaucracy, and the courts, and the role of the president in domestic and foreign policy. We will also, from time to time, discuss current events with an eye toward understanding what's going on from a political science perspective.

Course Assignments

Attendance and participation: Students are expected to attend class meetings having done the assigned readings and prepared to engage in discussions of the readings.

Weekly quizzes: Students will be required to complete weekly quizzes on Canvas. The quizzes will be on the material we've covered both in and out of class..

Response essays: Students will write four response essays on the topics we're covering in this class. These will be relatively short essays (3-4 pages) that are designed to give the students an opportunity to draw connections across the material we've covered and critically evaluate the arguments contained therein.

Literature review: As a final essay, students will write a literature review on a topic related to the politics of the American presidency. The literature review should be 8-10 pages (roughly 5000 words).
