Course Description:

This course examines the political behavior of Caribbean Americans in the United States with an emphasis on Caribbean Americans of African descent (Afro Caribbeans). There are 13 sovereign nations in the Caribbean: Antigua and Barbuda, The Bahamas, Barbados, Cuba, Dominica, Dominican Republic, Grenada, Haiti, Jamaica, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, and Trinidad and Tobago.

Many African Americans who have achieved prominence in civil rights and politics are of Caribbean origin. Candace Baker-Motley, Marcus Garvey, Kamala Harris, Malcolm X, Colin Powell, and Stokely Carmichael (Kwame Ture) are some of the individuals we will analyze in the class. We will also discuss issues of concern to Afro Caribbeans both in the U.S. and in their home countries with an emphasis on Cuba, Haiti, Jamaica, Puerto Rico, and the Dominican Republic. I welcome your feedback on the course if you have any questions or problems.

We will also participate in a virtual exchange project with faculty and students from Sheffield Hallam University's departments of global health, international relations, and sociology (located in Sheffield, England). We will focus on the themes of health inequalities, international human mobility, and Caribbean migration. At the end of the semester, you will watch lectures recorded by both me and their faculty members. On Thursday, November 6th you will participate in an online live session with their students during our class session. We will discuss the icebreaker activity

Course Objectives:

The learning objectives for the course are:

- Trace the history of major actors, developments, and political movements in African Americans politics since the modern civil rights movement.
- Distinguish the ideological and other differences between Democratic and Republican candidates.

- Explain the campaign tactics that African Americans used to win local, state, and national political offices.
- Determine whether African American women have been disadvantaged by both their race and gender when running for and serving in political offices.
- Detail the impact of public policies, such as affirmative action, on African Americans.

Your Grade will be Based on:

1) Class Participation (10%)

Class participation and attendance are extremely important in this seminar. Each student is expected to read the assigned materials before class and participate in class discussions. After three unexcused classes are missed, you will not receive the percentage points for class participation. It is your responsibility to sign an attendance roster that will be given out at the beginning of each class session. If you forget to, sign it during the next class. Also, try to get to class on time.

2) **Icebreaker** (10%):

This activity will allow you to compare and contrast your background and experiences in your home communities with those of the Sheffield Hallam University students during our live session on Thursday November 6th.

3) Sheffield Hallam Assignment (20%):

After we examine interdisciplinary information about Black Caribbean Studies in the United Kingdom, you will complete an assignment that requires a summary of the lectures from Sheffield Hallam University Professors and my lecture on Health Discrimination and Scapegoating of Caribbean immigrants and citizens in America. I have included questions on canvas that you must answer to complete these assignment. The typed, double-spaced assignment must be at least five pages and have a 12-point Times New Roman font.

4) Class Material Papers (60% or 20% each)

You must write an approximately eight-page paper on the topics listed on canvas. This paper will require an analysis of the assigned readings, lectures, and other class materials on this topic and answer the questions that are listed on canvas. Please don't forget to include citations in your paper. Use parenthetical citations in the paper that include the person's last name, year of publication, and page number-i.e., (Wright, 2020, 20). Then, include a Bibliography page at the end of the paper that lists your sources. The sources can be formatted according to the *Chicago Manual of Style, M.L.A.*, or the *American*

Psychological Association (A.P.A.) format. See the sources in the textbooks for examples.
