Political Science Supervisory Committee Guidelines

The appointment of your Supervisory Committee is very important. Your Supervisory Committee Chair will be your principal faculty advisor, and other faculty members of the Supervisory Committee will also act as advisors in their fields of expertise. The Committee also advises the Graduate Coordinator on your academic progress, and the Committee conducts the final M.A. examination or defense, the PhD dissertation prospectus defense, and the final Ph.D. dissertation defense.

In selecting a Supervisory Committee, it is usually advisable to speak with your prospective Supervisory Chair first. That person will be helpful in suggesting other members of your Supervisory Committee. The chair of a student's supervisory committee may ask for permission for a professor with special qualifications not holding Graduate Faculty status (including adjunct faculty) to serve on a student's committee.

The Supervisory Committee must be established no later than the semester prior to an MA thesis defense, an MA final examination (in lieu of a thesis), or a PhD field qualifying examination. The Supervisory Committee can be changed up until the semester that you expect to graduate. If a change in the Supervisory Committee must be made in the semester in which you expect to graduate, a written explanation of the necessity should be attached.

All faculty who are being added to or removed from a Supervisory Committee must be informed. If a proposed change in the Supervisory Committee follows a failed comprehensive examination or defense, the proposal must be accompanied by a letter stating no objection from any faculty member who is being removed from the Committee.

M.A. Supervisory Committees

M.A. students must have a Supervisory Chair, who is a faculty member in Political Science and is also a member of the Graduate Faculty. M.A. Supervisory Committees must have at least two other members of the Supervisory Committee, at least one of whom must be in Political Science. If a minor field outside of Political Science is designated, the Supervisory Committee must include a member of the Graduate Faculty from that field. Supervisory Committees for Political Campaigning have four faculty members, including one member who teaches a practical course.

Ph.D. Supervisory Committees

PhD Supervisory Committees include (1) A Supervisory Chair, who is a Graduate faculty member in Political Science, (2) A faculty member from Political Science not in the student's major field (3) Another Graduate Faculty member from Political Science (4) Another faculty member, usually from Political Science, but can be from another department, and (5) An external member (who is a member of the UF Graduate Faculty, but is not in the Department of Political Science).

UF faculty who are not members of the Graduate Faculty and faculty from outside UF may be appointed as Special Members (filling the fourth seat), with the approval of the Supervisory Chair, Graduate Coordinator,

and Graduate School. Membership on Supervisory Committees may be altered at the request of the faculty or the student.

Graduate Faculty

The privileges regarding the level of involvement of graduate faculty in supervising students are determined by the dean of the college and/or department chair in consultation with the faculty members and in accordance with criteria established by that unit. Tenured and tenure-track faculty in Departments that grant graduate degrees are generally appointed to the Graduate Faculty shortly after their arrival at UF. Lecturers may be granted Graduate Faculty Status by vote of the Graduate Faculty in the Department and the approval of the Dean of the Graduate School.
